Start checking for our new website on or about July 13. You may have to refresh your browser to launch the new content. Our web address will not change so you can still find us at [www.michiganaudubon.org](http://www.michiganaudubon.org).

Be sure to check the information we have posted for your chapter. Let us know if you would like to have something different on the “splash page” for your chapter. To find your chapter go to the “About Us” section and follow the links to your chapter page. We did not have information for every chapter or website links, so please let us know what we should add to your page, if it comes up blank.

The new site offers the ability for chapter’s to post their events on our event calendar. To submit an event to be posted on the site, go to the “News and Events” menu and click on “Event Calendar”. From there you will see an item in the blue side bar called “Submit an Event”. Click on it to bring up the form for sending us your chapter calendar items. ## AUDUBON ART EXHIBIT IN JACKSON

Plan to see the nationally traveling exhibition, *John James Audubon: American Artist and Naturalist*, at the Ella Sharp Museum of Art and History, now through August 29, 2009. The exhibition traces Audubon's life and development as an artist (1785-1851) and features 60 Double Elephant Folio-sized, hand colored engravings from his masterwork, *The Birds of America*. Also included in the exhibition are original oil paintings, personal letters, documents, photographs and personal artifacts from Audubon's life. This exciting exhibition will also feature wood carvings from the Andy Andrews Collection and taxidermy mounts from the Museum's collections.



This traveling exhibition comes from the John James Audubon Museum and State Park in Henderson, Kentucky. The Ella Sharp Museum of Art and History is located in the Ella W. ## CANOE OUTING PLANNED



Michigan Audubon is offering a Birding by Canoe/Kayak program this summer. The event is part of the KanoetheKazoo event. Participants need to provide their own canoe or kayak. Pre-registration is required. The float will take place on July 11 (rain date July 12) on Fish Lake in Barry County. The float is approximately 2 miles. We expect to see herons and various waterfowl species, along with Osprey, Marsh Wren, Common Yellowthroat, as well as many species of turtles, frogs, snakes, and mammals.

## SUMMER FUN AT MICHIGAN AUDUBON SANCTUARIES

### **Keweenaw Peninsula Sanctuaries Host Open Houses**

Both the Brockway Mountain Sanctuary and the Lake Bailey Sanctuary will host an open house on Saturday, July 11 from 10 a.m. – 2 p.m. The Lake Bailey Sanctuary consists of 405 acres and is located near Eagle Harbor. Lake Bailey is home to the very rare Heart-leaved Arnica (*Arnica cordifolia*). Just a few miles down the road sits the 394-acre Brockway Mountain Sanctuary which overlooks the town of Copper Harbor and is home to the state-threatened Red-stemmed Ceanothus (*Ceanothus sanguineus*). The Keweenaw Peninsula is the only location in Michigan where this plant can be found. The views from both of these sanctuaries are spectacular and the birdlife is abundant.

Michigan Audubon staff and volunteers from the Cooper Country Audubon Club chapter will be on hand to provide information about these beautiful sanctuaries and lead guided hikes. ### **Workshop Offered: Building and Maintaining Nest Boxes for Wildlife**

Installing a nest box is one way to attract birds and mammals to your backyard. Workshop participants will learn how to construct and maintain nest boxes for a variety of wildlife species, such as Bluebirds, Kestrels, Screech Owls, Wood Ducks, and Swallows. The workshop will take place on Saturday, July 18, 2–4 p.m. at the Bernard W. Baker Bird Sanctuary near Bellevue. Workshop participants will meet at the Baker Lodge which is located at the east entrance to the sanctuary. Cost is \$15 per person or \$10 for Michigan Audubon members. Pre-registration is required and is limited to 12 participants. Participants need to bring their own hammers. Contact Wendy Tatar at 517-886-9144 to register.

### **Family Camp Out at Ronald H. Warner Sanctuary**

Michigan Audubon will host a one-night campout at the Ronald H. Warner Sanctuary on August 8-9. Activities will start at 2:00 p.m. on Saturday. We'll explore trails and do some birding, talk about Cerulean Warblers, and look for amphibians. We'll grill hotdogs for dinner. Enjoy a s'more while you listen to stories from Tom Funke, Michigan Audubon's conservation director, during the planned evening bonfire. Pitch your tent and fall asleep to the sounds of crickets and cicadas. Bring your own breakfast and plan on leaving by 10:00 am.

Registration for the campout is required and can be made by contacting Wendy at 517-886-9144. Michigan Audubon members: \$15 per adult, \$5 per child ages 4 – 17; children under age 4 are free. Non member's participation fee is \$25 per adult, \$10 per child. No unaccompanied minors allowed. Bring your own tent. We encourage you to bring binoculars, field guides, and your camera. Don't forget the bug repellent! No RV hookup available. Event held rain or shine. The Ronald H. Warner Sanctuary is located approximately five miles southwest of Hastings on Erway Rd.

### **Family Camp Out at Lake Bluff**

Michigan Audubon will host a one-night campout on the beach at the Lake Bluff Bird Sanctuary on July 18 & 19. Activities will start at 2:00 p.m. on Saturday. We'll explore trails and discuss trail building, do some local birding at Lake Bluff and at Orchard Beach State Park, talk about dunes, beach vegetation, and tell some stories. Bring your own dinner. Pitch your tent on the shores of Lake Michigan and let the waves put you to sleep on Saturday night. In the morning there will be a continental breakfast in the Gray house.

Michigan Audubon members: \$30 per adult, \$20 per child ages 4 – 17; children under age 4 are free. Non member's participation fee is \$40 per adult, \$30 per child. No unaccompanied minors allowed. Bring your own tent. No RV hookup available. Event held rain or shine.
