## **KIRTLAND'S WARBLER POPULATION REACHES ANOTHER RECORD HIGH**

Department of Natural Resources officials have released annual survey information indicating the state's population of the endangered Kirtland's warbler is the highest number of birds recorded since monitoring began in 1951, with 1,791 singing males observed during this year's census. ## **NEOTROPICAL MIGRATORY BIRD CONSERVATION ACT**

Alicia Frances King, Director of the Bird Conservation Alliance, sent this request for action in support of the NMBCA reauthorization at higher funding levels. If you have not done so already, please contact your House and Senate representatives to ask them to support the bipartisan legislation S. 3490 in the Senate and H.R. 5756, in the House before they recess for the November elections. Both bills reauthorize the existing NMBCA, but at significantly higher levels to multiply the successes of the NMBCA.
